I honestly love my job and I truly enjoy doing what I do for the students.

But I would not be saying that without the support from the most amazing farm manager and the best bunch of kids.

The agricultural industry needs agricultural teachers to keep exposing the next generation to all of the opportunities. Agriculture in schools needs to be industry relevant.

We must immerse students into it or else they will never learn the full magni-

checking and watching over tude of agricultural industry. But many principals

overlook the opportunities created and only denote an agricultural teacher who seems to be leaving work for in, we get the job done. But excursions more often than not. Teachers are working with minimal resources, time and money. However, it's amazing how much can be achieved with a supportive community surrounding

If you're an industry professional, expert or leader then reach out to your local school and see if you can join them in the classroom, donate animals or offer advice.

If you're a principal, go and ask past agricultural students what they learnt most and where because I know that it was not in the classroom.

Thank you to all the ag teachers out there and thank you to those special ones who gave me the opportunities to achieve what I've accomplished so far.
